



Johnson County Government Expands Fair Chance Hiring Practices



Recently, Johnson County Commissioners endorsed a change to the county's hiring practices that will remove the conviction history check box from initial job applications, ensuring that qualified candidates are not denied a job opportunity solely based on past actions.

This Fair Chance Hiring practice, known as Ban the Box, has been adopted by 23 states and more than 100 jurisdictions across the country, as well as leading

private employers including Koch Industries, Walmart, Target, and Home Depot. Fair Chance Hiring offers a "second chance" to people with felony records, while simultaneously stimulating the economy, broadening the workforce, and supporting the well-being of families and children. We commend Johnson County Commissioners and the County Manager for adopting this practice.

This decision aligns with the UCS Framework for Reducing Poverty and Creating Opportunity. UCS has made nearly 30 presentations on the Framework to more than 600 Johnson County public officials, city leaders, and residents since June 2015. The presentations came with a call-to-action to the human service sector encouraging them to embrace policies and practices to reduce poverty and create opportunity, including Fair Chance Hiring.
